Since 1983, we have been serving our neighbors throughout the Lowcountry. 2021 was a year of transition and growth as we continued to serve those in need. We are committed to bringing a better quality of life to our neighbors through sharing resources, developing relationships and building a sustainable future.

Our Board of Directors and staff engaged in a strategic planning process in 2021 that led to a new name. Tricounty Family Ministries became Neighbors Together on Monday, October 4, 2021. We had witnessed the transformation that occurred when neighbors came together to help one another through the pandemic. This is who we have always been: neighbors working together to build up our community.

North Charleston Mayor Keith Summey, Charleston Mayor John Tecklenburg and Charleston County Council Chairman Teddie E. Pryor, Sr. were our honored guests for this major milestone in our history. More than 200 long-time supporters attended the event, launching us into a future filled with hope and promise.

During 2021, our priority was expanding partnerships to build bridges between organizations in our community. We worked with Lowcountry Continuum of Care to provide outreach services for our homeless neighbors. Our organization supported Charleston County's effort to house families in crisis by providing the case management for their program. We worked with Turn 90, sharing groceries with men who are on track to avoid returning to prison. Neighbors Together deepened our relationship with the Lowcountry Food Bank, expanding our food delivery program for senior citizens when other organizations were overwhelmed. One of our local schools, Mary Ford Elementary, became a partner site where we provided targeted support services for families at risk. Additionally, our relationship with DHEC expanded as we held multiple vaccine clinics and other immunizations.

We celebrate all the accomplishments of 2021 which you will see outlined in the pages of this Annual Report. We give thanks for all our supporters who have helped us get to this point: our volunteers, our donors, our Board of Directors, and all who serve as ambassadors for us in the community. Because of your support, we continue to serve as a safety net for our neighbors, helping them rebuild in times of crisis. Thanks to our wide network of partner organizations, businesses, and faith groups, we continue to share dignity and hope with our community.

NAVIGATING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

2021 was a transformational year in the life of Neighbors Together. The pandemic is a marathon, not a sprint, and we have been in training. We have developed flexibility so that we could adjust our operations to prioritize health and safety. We have strengthened our support, growing our community of donors, so that we could expand our services. We have grown our team, adding new staff and honing our skills, so that we can position ourselves to expand our programming outreach.

While challenging, we didn't let the Pandemic slow us down because we knew the need from our community was as great as ever. We saw the number of neighbors dealing with hunger for the first time climb 44% in 2021. We expanded our rental and utility assistance program to meet the needs of the dozens of neighbors who call each week.

We didn't let the challenge of the Pandemic dampen our vision of expanding programs to serve more neighbors.

At the start of the year, we welcomed a new Program Director who has worked to improve our case management process and lay the groundwork for the expansion of our job training program. Our new Emergency Needs Program Manager provides in-depth training for our Assessment Counselors and helps to improve our application process for rent and utility assistance. We are continuing to professionalize every area of our operations including the volunteer experience, development and programming.

The Pandemic has impacted every aspect of our neighbors' lives — and we are here to walk with them through these unprecedented times — every step of the way.

OUR FOUR PILLARS OF SERVICE

We began 2021 with a strategic planning process that led to a new vision and mission statement. Thanks to direction from a strong and inspired Board of Directors, we were led to focus on four key areas, our "pillars of service," as we have come to regard them: Hunger, Health & Wellness, Homelessness and Job Training.

HUNGER

Since we opened our doors in 1983, Neighbors Together has provided more than 7.5 million meals. We serve hot lunches four days a week, we deliver groceries to the home-bound and we offer emergency groceries from our food pantry to neighbors in need.



HEALTH & WELLNESS

Our Health & Wellness program focuses on helping under-served and uninsured individuals with their medical needs, while fostering relationships that empower them to better maintain their own long-term health.



PREVENTING HOMELESSNESS

Our focus is on helping women and children at-risk for homelessness. Our development team found major financial support through grants, local corporations and government to move our vision of a shelter for women and children forward.



JOB TRAINING

We began to lay the groundwork for an improved job training program that will offer online classes through partnerships, support for new small businesses, budgeting and wealth-building courses.



FIGHTING HUNGER

Each week, Neighbors Together works to feed people who are hungry. Monday through Thursday we offer hot meals between 10:30 am – 12:30 pm. On Wednesdays we supply emergency groceries to our neighbors in need. In 2021, we began a partnership with Turn 90, sharing groceries with the men in their program. We have also deepened our relationship with the Lowcountry Food Bank by expanding our food delivery program for senior citizens when other organizations were overwhelmed. Our Thanksgiving and Christmas celebrations included a hot meal with all the fixings. Neighbors also received a turkey and groceries to then prepare an at-home holiday dinner. All this was made possible through our amazing partners. We are continuing to seek out the healthiest items to share, including fresh vegetables and lean meat, all sourced from local groceries and farms.





EMILE LACROIX

Emile LaCroix can no longer work after being hit by a car on Rivers Avenue, resulting in a stroke. Being able to walk to Neighbors Together for a hot meal has kept Emile from going hungry during difficult times. Since 1983, Neighbors Together has offered food to the hungry across the Tricounty area, serving an estimated 7.5 million people over our 38-year history. Donors, community organizations, businesses and faith organizations make all of this possible.

PREVENTING HOMELESSNESS

Statistics show that on any given night over 4,200 people are homeless in the Lowcountry, many of them women and children, living in cars, under bridges or even in temporary motels. Neighbors Together is committed to providing dignity and hope to women and children by offering utility and rental assistance. We also provide budgeting guidance to help prevent homelessness. Additionally, we work with key community partners to support people who do not have a place to stay.

In 2021, Neighbors Together shared our vision of a shelter for homeless women and children. Government leaders, corporations, and several foundations responded with financial pledges to make this a reality. We look forward to making key announcements in 2022 as we move closer to our goal.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

Our Health & Wellness program focuses on helping underserved and uninsured neighbors with their medical needs, while fostering relationships that empower them to better maintain their own long-term health. Staffed by volunteer nurses, the clinic sees hundreds of patients each year with a variety of medical challenges.

Professional nurses volunteer their time running the program and are trained to help cut through red tape and complete applications that allow patients to obtain long-term, life-sustaining medications directly from the manufacturer at little or no cost.

Thanks to partnerships with DHEC and Palmetto Palace, we hosted vaccine clinics to help protect our neighbors from COVID and flu. Through the OneSCFund, neighbors in need of dentures or glasses are now able to see more clearly and brighten their smiles. In 2022, we will be partnering with the Shifa Health Clinic to expand our services to reach even more neighbors than before.
